HBC would like to welcome two new players, VICKY ANDERSON and SUSIE HENDERSON, plus welcome back an old friend, MARK MIKOLON.



Intermediate Corner Black to play 5-5? 5 Point Match Black-l White-0

This position occurred during the Final match of a Thursday evening HBC event. This is called an Intermediate problem because all of the experienced players I have asked have played it the same way. Before I get the answer to the play, let us look at the position again. Black has the innerboard advantage of four points to White's two points. The pip count is even at 137, but Black will be ahead by 20 pips after the move. The only disadvantage is that Black has two pieces back to White's one.



Now consider the rules you have learned to govern your play.

- 1) Do not break your mid-point unless you have escaped your back pieces or at least have an advanced anchor.
 - 2) Build your innerboard points from the 6 point down in order.
 - 3) More....

Now before the answer, let us look at how many good rolls White has if it was his turn. His thoughts are to escape his last piece or trap your two back pieces. 6-6,6-5,6-4,6-3,6-2,6-1,5-5,5-4,5-3,5-2, 4-4,4-3,4-2,4-1,3-3,3-1,2-2,2-1,1-1 for a total of 32 rolls.

Now the move is 8-3(2) and 6-lx(2). This move puts White on the bar against a five point board, so White's good rolls are reduced to ll (any 6). The experienced player has learned to weigh the rules that governs his play. He realizes that he has to find a way to escape his back pieces by limiting White's good rolls. If White fails to enter, Black has a chance for a gammon. The question is "Should Black double if White dances?" If Black picks up the blot on the 16 point, White would have a hard time escaping a gammon. And of course, if White is gammoned with the cube on 2, he loses the match.

Report from the North American Backgammon Championships

The tournament was split into two events with 61 in each event. The first event ran from Wednesday to Friday which saw LEE GENUD defeating R. GIANNINI in the final. The second tournament ran from Friday to Sunday with KENT GOULDING winning over PAUL MAGRIEL.

Some MURRAY'S BACKGAMMON by Bob Leibel (from LVBG, Spring 1982)

COFFEE DRINKER'S LAMENT: Going to the bathroom changes your luck, but only if you are hot - this does not work in reverse.

CRAWFORD'S PRINCIPLE: If a gammon is needed by your opponent while at the Crawford game, chances are he will get one.

AZZAM'S COMMENT: When the final criteria for accepting a double is, "At least I won't be gammoned," you will be gammoned.

OPENING PRECEPT: Slotting on your five-point on opening roll will be hit more often than the law of averages should allow.
