## HBC NEWSLETTER SPECIAL - CALCUTTA AUCTION

CALCUTTA AUCTION - Every thing you wanted to know, but were afraid to ask!! The Calcutta Auction is held just before play begins for most tournaments. The player(s) is sold to the person with the highest bid. The players are sold individually as well as in groups usually depending on their relative known backgammon skills. All the money collected is placed in a separate "Calcutta" pool. As the winners are determined, the buyers of the players, not the players, collect the prizes from the Calcutta Pool. Generally, the average selling price is close to the entry fee. The buyer is obligated to offer to sell interest back to the player(s) bought, called "buy-back". So as a buyer, you do not have to front the full cost, only a percentage.

When a player is sold as an individual, the buyer usually has to offer at least 50% interest to the player. If the player buys-back the full 50%, both the buyer and player have a 50% interest in the calcutta prize. The percentage interest a person has in a player is called "pay-back". So, the buyer and the player each have a 50% "pay-back" in this situation. If a player buys himself, he receives both the player's and calcutta prize for that finish.

The next situation is when a buyer buys a group with two players. In most cases, players are bought by someone else and they are informed of how much the buyback is and what pay-backs they have in theirself and the other players sold in his group. As a player, you have the right to know if you are getting your fair share. Trying to understand buy-back versus pay-back with a group of players can make some feel you need a PhD in math. Hopefully with some examples, it can become a bit clearer. With two players, both players have equal shares or 50% of the selling price. If a two-player group is sold for \$400, each player has an effective selling price of \$200.

Let's use a situation where the buyer has to offer buy-backs at least 37 1/2% of the selling price to each player. That leaves 25% for the buyer. For that, each player would receives a 50% pay-back of himself and 25% of what the other player wins. Now we can work some simple math to check this (we change the percentages to fractions). Let's work backwards to show that 37 1/2% (or 3/8) is correct. Each player receives 50% (or 1/2) pay-back interest in himself and 25% (or 1/4) of the other player so  $(1/2 \times 1/2) + (1/4 \times 1/2) = 1/4 + 1/8 = 3/8$ . This equation relates to each player as 50% pay-back of his share of the selling price (or 1/2) plus 25% pay-back of the other player's share of the selling price (also 1/2) for a total price of 37 1/2% (or 3/8). The buyer receives 25% interest in both players:  $(1/4 \times 1/2) + (1/4 \times 1/2) = 1/8 + 1/8 = 1/4$ . Player A's share (3/8) + Player B's share (3/8) + Buyer (1/4) share = 1.0 of the total selling price.

There's one more way to verify by checking that money paid out equals money paid back. Let's use an ideal situation where the two-player group was bought for \$400 and both won \$200 for a total of \$400. Each player buys-backs the full  $37\ 1/2$ % or  $(3/8\ X\ $400)$  = \$150. Money paid out = \$150 + \$150 + \$100 (buyer amount) = \$400. Both players tied and won calcutta prize of \$200 to total \$400. Player A receives 50% of himself (\$100) + 25% of other player (\$50) = \$150. Player B receives 50% of himself (\$100) + 25% of other player (\$50) = \$150. The buyer receives 25% of both players (\$50) = \$100 Total pay-back = \$400. Each player and the buyer in this ideal situation receives back just what he paid showing again these percentages are correct.

Some other buy-backs and pay-backs examples. With a 3-player group: each player can buy-back 25% of the selling price. In return each player receives a pay-back 35% of himself and 20% of the other two. With a 4-player group: each player can buy-back 20% of the selling price. In return each player receives a pay-back 25% of himself and 15% of the other three.

HBC believes the more you understand about tournament and all the activities, the more you will enjoy them. Do not be afraid to ask!

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
