"Slow down, you move too fast...."


The lyrics from a Simon & Garfunkel song have some meaning in backgammon also. The bearoff is usually the fastest part of the game. For the novice and some intermediate players, the fast pace can lead to some misplays. The advanced player can quickly spot the positions which require some thought and make the correct play. Here are two positions which in a bearoff would require some thought. See if you can make the correct play. Answers are below.

Position One. In making your play, you should always be comparing your position to your opponent's side. In this position, your opponent will win 5 out of 36 with doubles 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6's on his next roll. You want to maximize your chances, when he does not roll the doubles. With a one to play, you have three choices and realizing that only doubles will win for you, you must try to make as many doubles do the job. Double 6's, 5, 4, and 3's work no matter which one But can you make double 2's work? By moving 3 to 2, yes you can! you move.

Position Two. In bearing off, most of the time you remove the numbers rolled. But when you roll a small number that can not bear off, you have to make a choice of which higher number to move. In Position Two, the novice player In Position Two, the novice player often quickly plays 4-off & 3-1 without giving thought to the other play of 4-2 & 3-off. The key to this position is making the most numbers work for you. By playing 4-off &  $\bar{3}$ -1 rolling any number with a 2 besides double 2's on the next two rolls will cause you to need another roll to bearoff. These numbers force you to move from the 3 to the 1-point again. But if 4-2 & 3-off is You only get punished if you roll a 2 played then you are making 2's good. two times out of the last 3 rolls. By moving 4-2 & 3-off, the chances winning would be 72% over 60% for moving 4-off & 3-1. This means by making the 2's good, you will win 12 more games out of 100!
