9th Chicago Open

The 10-match format used at the 9th Chicago Open is growing in popularity, especially with the Intermediates. The Open division plays until 4 losses occur and the Intermediate division plays all 10 matches. 

The Importance of Avoiding Bad Numbers

An interesting position arose recently in a chouette among several of the better local players which led to a rather strong exchange between the captain and one of the crew members regarding the proper play of 5-1 in the position below:



The captain, recognizing the possibility of subsequent bad roll(s) requiring the breaking of his anchor on the box's 5-point, wanted to play Bar-20, 5-4. A crewman, a staunch advocate of avoiding the immediate bad numbers, preferred Bar-24, 20-15. As both players believed their solution to be vastly superior, the captain eventually exercised his perogative and made his play. Of course, as lady luck often decrees, the captain on his roll got double 4s and his remaining defense was promptly shattered. The box promptly cubed. The crewman smirked and dropped, happy to lose but one unit. The captain, apparenty still confident of his play, took and in the fullness of time was appropriately gammoned. At the conclusion of the game, the captain remarked that he would play the roll in question the same. The crewman retorted that the captain would still be wrong and the two exchanged no further kind words that night.

So, what's the best play in cases like this? On rolling out the position 100 times from each alternative, the following results were obtained:

Play	Captain's	Crewman's
Box Regular	58	42
Wins Gammon	14	13
Captain Regular	26	41
Wins Gammon	2	4
Captain's Equity (*)	-1.21	-0.19

(*) Assuming double by the box and take by the captain.

Note that the crewman's play resulted in one fewer gammons by the box, the probable overriding concern of the captain's avoidance of breaking of the box's 5-point. However, there are too many future combinations of bad rolls from the captain's position that effectively destory any chance of turning the game around for the win. Had there been but two checkers on the 20-point, the captain's fears may have been justified, but the far greater danger was what in fact happened — collapsed defense in the home board, box hits more blots, captain unable to bring all pieces around in time to avoid the gammon. The crewman's play yields no greater risk of a crushing roll by the box than currently exists and almost assures retention of his 4-, 5-, and 6-points as well as a high probability of reestablishing the third checker on the 20-point and/or establishing a 3-5 or 2-5 back game should the latter be a desirable alternative. The captain's failure to provide for one or more 4-small rolls in following turna decreased his chances of winning with no commensurate protection from the gammon. The lesson here is similar to the purchase of insurance: beyond the necessary amount, the expense is wasted. Secondly, avoid giving yourself bad single numbers particularly in games of high volatility. In the above case, two single numbers were bad, inviting the disaster that eventually befell the captain.
