

### "SLY" wins WORLD CUP

Joe Sylvester found a great tournament to end his dry streak, THE WORLD CUP hosted by Kent Goulding and Bill Robertie. The strong international field of 45 players read like the who's who's in backgammon. Joe had to win 6 matches against, in order, Billy Horan, Mike Corbett, Australian Bill Marczar, Texan Malcolm Davis, Alan Steffen, and Ray Glaeser in the final to capture the prestigious cup. In the 41 point match, Ray had a commanding lead 23-15 after 24 games and 4½ hours of play. As it turned out game 25 was the pivot point of the match. Ray had the cube at 2 with Joe bearing-off against a 2-4 backgame. Joe had beared-off 5 checkers when Ray got a shot and hit it. Ray managed to close his home board and recubed to 4 - JOE TOOK. The game progressed to the position to the right in which Joe took over ten minutes to ponder a redouble to 8. Joe stated afterwords that his give point was 45% and estimated his winning chances at 56%. Joe knew Ray had a take but would only double if Ray did not have a redouble. Joe doubled - Ray took - Joe rolled 62 (2-off) - Ray rolled 63 (4-off, 4-1) and without doubles rolled on either side, Joe won the 8-cube to tie the score at 23 - BREAK. In the next 17 games, Joe out scored Ray 14 to 8 and Game 43 below looked like the game for Ray to get back in the match.

### Survey SAYS!

A survey was conducted during the 36th INDIANA OPEN with the results to be used to help mold the future of the INDIANA tournaments. The results are included with this mailing. To summarize, the survey said players on the whole enjoy the INDIANA tournaments. The dislikes included the hotel (the Atkinson), long waits, length of matches and smoke. The dislikes plus suggestions for changes included comments general to all tournaments like the smoke and slow play. The part of the survey which generated the most controversy was on the Hölland Rule. The survey provided space for general comments and interesting reading for everyone

HBC has responded to some of the items. The 5th INDIANA CLASSIC is being held at The Viscount Hotel; rated 4 STARS by AAA (only 1 of 4 in the state of INDIANA). The HBC staff received a lot of negative flack when this was announced by players who enjoyed having the tournament downtown close to Union Station. HBC will try very hard to move the tournament back downtown for the spring tournament. The Atkinson Hotel was sold and will reopen as the Omni Severin Hotel November 1989 after a \$40 million renovation. For the players who had long waits, HBC has added an event to give the players something to do. The MicroBlitz (details in flyer).

The vote on the Holland Rule was close 30-Yes, 26-No and 12-No opinion. But when looking at the all reasons given why, it did not look close at all. A person (outside the survey) stated his reason for it this way - "In all doubling positions before the Crawford Game, the cube is used by taking in account a position and the score. In post Crawford games and not using the Holland Rule, the cube is used only because of the score". This seems to go against the philosophy of the cube. Read the responses and let HBC what you think. HBC will add the Holland Rule to it's rules on a trial basis starting with the 5th INDIANA CLASSIC.

Side Note This part of the survey generated a lot of talk which included the Crawford Rule. One player explained why it came about. In some situations during a match and without the Crawford Rule, the cube has no leverage; example tied 7-7 in a 9 point match. The underdog will drop easily because he can double early next game.

## New event added to Thursday weekly play

Weekly play has 15 to 16 players consistently and sometimes over 16. Since there is no grid to handle 17 plus without tons of byes or playing much later because of the extra rounds, a new event, HOOSIER QUAD, will be added to weekly play. The format will be double elimination with 9 point matches. The final will be an 11 point match with the undefeated starting with 4 points. Gammon points will be slightly larger because of the longer matches. The entry fee will vary from \$15 to \$25 at over 90% return and with 4 players your winning chances are 25% compared to 6% in a group of 16. Let us know how you like it?

#### Editorial

There is a thorn in the side of backgammon which is plaguing tournaments. Directors may in time be put in a position to take action if the thorn is not removed. Backgammon is an intense game and some matches will take longer than average to complete. But it's the player who takes longer than everyone else repeatedly that is the thorn - the slow player. Having a slow player at a tournament is like driving high proformence car on the interstate highway in second gear.

It's up to the player to realize that if the pattern continues, a director at some point will have to refuse his/her entry because it can jeopardize the completion of the tournament in a timely matter. A director has no means of accommodating a 'slow player' and the for the good of the tournament, he/she will refuse the entry. It's also up to the director to warn a player of this situation.

The bottom line is - everyone goes to a tournament to have a good time. To have one player cause everyone else to wait and then play into the wee hours of the morning to catch up or play late on Sunday is not fun.
