
The National Labor Day Backgammon Tournament featuring the National Club Team Challenge

September 1-4, 1989 in Indianapolis directed by Butch Meese.

37th INDIANA OPEN - Radisson Hotel - Indianapolis

A record crowd, excellent hotel/shopping mall and lots of backgammon were some the comments received by the tournament staff about the 37th INDIANA Open. Attendance was a record (see graph) over the last 5 years. The doubles event was almost a clean sweep for Michigan players: Mike Nelson (MA) teamed with Dean Adamian to finish second. Yamin Yamin (IL) won over Frank Talbot (MI) in the INDY500. The MicroBlitz events proved to be popular again with Bob Holyon (WI) capturing the Open MicroBlitz and Steve Hast (PA) winning the Limited. Red-hot Doug Roberts (won Reno) came through the main flight undefeated but went cold against streaking Gary Kay (Chicago). Gary lost his second round match in the main and proceeded to win 8 straight matches to capture the Open Division top prize. Ed King (OH) used his free entry, donated by HBC to benefit Operation Feed (raised \$650), to finish second in the Intermediate Division. He was the main undefeated but was defeated twice in the finals by Paul Franks (Chicago). In the novice division, both Louis Steiner (PA), winner, and Mary Franks (Chicago), finalist, graduated to the Intermediate Division in future tournaments. Congratulations to all the winners.




National Rules

The new U. S. Backgammon Rules and Procedures have now been used at two tournaments, the Bluegrass Regional and the 37th Indiana Open and will continue to be used at other tournaments throughout the year. The present rules are considered the first working draft and changes will be made every 6 to 12 months. It is up to you, the players, to give these rules serious consideration and send in your impressions, comments and suggestions to one of the newsletters. If you do not yet have a copy and want one, mail a self-addressed stamped envelope to HBC to receive a copy.

Estimation of the Winning Chances -- Beating the Double Shot

The 9th Annual Chicago Open hosted by Howard Markowitz was a very enjoyable tournament for this writer because of its somewhat unusual format that provides the intermediate player with a minimum of 10 matches in the main tournament plus a shot at the consolation if his/her won-lost record does not qualify for the main finals. The experience in match play is extremely valuable and the ability to recoup part of the entry fee for each match won retains some incentive throughout main bracket play. Though my fortune in the main tournament was less than good, in the single-elimination consolation flight, I reached the semi-final and was at double-match point in the match; the winner advancing to a guaranteed payout spot. The game started as a hitting duel and reached the position shown



After a brief pause to wish for the dots on the dice to change to something a bit more favorable, I (X) played 15-6 and hoped for the best. No such luck. My opponent threw one of 5 good 8's and hit. Although my opponent could also hit with 10 (3 additional numbers), those hits would actually be to my benefit on balance either by leaving additional blots or by the total vacation of my 5-point and forfeiting future double shot probability. My next roll of 6-3 missed his open targets and the rout was on. I soon had two checkers flying behind a 5-prime and was easily defeated. C'est la backgammon.

Normally I would have cursed my luck, packed up the checkers and looked for a chouette but the tournament was winding down and action was sparse. So I reset the position and asked a few of the open division players about the position. All agreed that the 15-6 play was the only reasonable play, but they also estimated O's winning chances at no better than slightly over 50% because of X's excellently timed two point backgame and my awkward bear-in situation. Being somewhat surprised at this low estimate, I later rolled out the position after the 15-6 play 100 times. The play of subsequent rolls is relatively straightforward assuming that O's priority is to maintain his 5-3 backgame and establishment of a 5-prime in or near his home board. X's moves are largely forced with some variation if he immediately gets the return hit(s) from the bar. How often does X win? Would you believe 61% of the time. And with twice the gammons that O gets (though in this case, gammons were irrelevant). So, what's the point, you ask? There are a few. First, estimation of winning chances can be tough, even for the best of players. Second, double shots are overrated. O will average about 1.4 per game from this position, hitting a little over half of those and yet winning only a moderate percentage of those games. The earlier the hit, the less often O wins, a substantial contribution to O's winning chances. O won no games in which he did not get the hit at all, around 25% probability. A minor learning point for the less experienced player gained from this relatively tedious exercise is that "stacking" checkers on points, if possible, is a partially effective defense against the double-point back game as such as tactic can "kill" at least one number and help destroy the timing of the opponent's back game, thereby often reducing the double shot probability to one of a single shot. WORLD CUP Match Joe Sylvester versus Alan Steffen 37 Point SemiFinal Match

During 1989, this match will be presented in its entirety in this newsletter, 1 to 4 games each month. This month games 10 and 11 are on the next page. Along with the 34 games, all the doubling positions will be presented. There are some both interesting and exciting games in this match between two of the best.

Instructions:

You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 with all points numbered based on the view of the player on roll. The home portion of the board is numbered 1-6. Bearing off is denoted as moving to the 0 'zero' point. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is denoted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 52 and the 5-point make and the 2-point open.

Abbreviations used are CB - Closed Board, EF - Entry Failure, NP - No Play Possible, x - opponents piece was hit, 5^2 - superscribe denotes 2 or pieces moving to the same point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point.

In the doubling positions, Joe will be 'X' and Alan 'O' and are shown from Joe Sylvester's side of the board. Study those first before going through the games.




