National Club Team Challenge

The first National Club Team Challenge was won by the New Jersey Backgammon Club with a surprise second by the Hoosier Backgammon Club. The other two clubs competing in the final 4-team round-robin grid were the Chicago Bar Point (Gary Kay, Tak Morioka & Yamin Yamin) and the Backgammon In Georgia, Inc (Dave Cardwell, Jerry Hartsman & Samra Hadden). The final stage had a lot of drama with the winner determined by the last match. The other clubs that entered were the College Park Backgammon Club (Jim Baroff, Karen Davis & Ed O'Laughlin), Festival Backgammon Club (Fred Badagnani, Brian Moss Marty Storer), Flint Area Backgammon Club (John Carrico, Carol Joy Cole & Rick Todd), Louisville Backgammon Club (Harold Branch, Terry Kuchenbrod & Sharon Lennon), New England Backgammon Club (Bill Robertie, Roy Friedman, Walter Trice), NY/NJ Coop (Dr Bob Hill, James Roston, Ron Whitney), Plymouth Backgammon Club (Dean Adamian, Judy Field & Gary Fritzsche) and Twin Cities Backgammon Club (Steve Brown, Duane Jensen, Ralph Stowell). Rick Barabino was scheduled to play with the NEBC and defend his challenge, but weather delayed his flight and Walter Trice was substituted at the last minute. Outstanding individual efforts were turned in by Gary Kay (6-0), Doug Roberts (5-0), Dave Cardwell (5-1), Chuck Stimming (5-1) and Bill Robertie (3-0). The format used in this year's challenge was found to have a few problems and an improved format will be formulated for next year.

Main Events

The swiss movement type format produced some interesting results. For nine rounds, players competed for a win-loss record which would guarantee a spot in the final 8 (final 4 in the novice). Players with 7 to 9 wins were in the final 8 (4) and players with 6-3 records had to play-off for the remaining spots.

Open Division

In the Open division, nine 6-3 players played-off for the three remaining spots. All three players who won their way into the final 8 also made it to the final 4 and two made it to the finals. With this format, a player with 3 losses can still win the tournament. Because it took over 7 hours to play 2-11 point matches in the quarter and semifinals, first and second place prize money was split and both players will receive a trophy as winner.

WORLD CUP Match Joe Sylvester vs Alan Steffen 37 Point SemiFinal

During 1989, this match is being presented in this newsletter, 1 to 4 games each month and this month games 20 thru 23 are presented. Along with the 34 games, all the doubling positions will be included. There are some both interesting and exciting games in this match between two of the best.

Instructions: You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 with all points numbered based on the view of the player on roll. The home portion of the board is numbered 1-6. Bearing off is denoted as moving to the 0 'zero' point. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is denoted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 52 with the 5-point made and the 2-point open.

Abbreviations used are CB - Closed Board, EF - Entry Failure, NP - No Play Possible, x - opponents piece was hit, 5^2 - superscribe denotes 2 or more pieces moving to the same point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point. In the doubling positions, Joe will be dark checkers and Alan the light and are shown from Joe Sylvester's side of the board. Study those first before going through the games.






Game 20 - Move 7, O doubles to 2?




Game 21 - Move 4, Odoubles to 2?

Club Spotlite - DBL

Dallas is rapidly becoming the 'IN' place in the United States to play backgammon. Several players from locations as distant as Virginia and California are planning Texas backgammon vacations in order to learn from the many strong metroplex area players.

Dallas has a rich backgammon heritage dating back to the 1930s. It was the home of the famed gamesman and author Oswald Jacoby and his brilliant wife, Mary Zita. Many of the 'Modern' theories of play were developed in Dallas.

The Backgammon Book written by Jacoby and John Crawford and published in 1970 was the first book to provide the mathematics of the doubling cube. It is considered by many to be the best backgammon book ever written.

The new wave of interest in backgammon in Dallas is primarily due to the formation of the Dallas Backgammon League (DBL) in December 1988 and it's promotional newsletter *The Double*.

Many Dallas area players assisted in the formation of DBL with Malcolm Davis and Bill Barron emerging as it's leaders. Nancy Williams directs weekly local tournaments at Dave & Busters, Walnut Hill and N. Central Express Way, Dallas at 7:30 PM on Wednesdays.

Entry fees are: main bracket \$15, consolation \$5, optional side pool \$10. 90% of the money collected is paid out each week. The other 10% is accumulated primarily to subsidize year end tournament and to provide awards to players.

Master points are awarded for participation and achievement with the top eight masters qualifying for the year end masters tournament.

All other players participating in eight or more weekly tournaments are eligible to play in the year end top-flight tournament.

Membership fees are \$10 per year with all members receiving the monthly newsletter, *The Double*, edited by Bill Barron. Davis and Barron think *The Double* is presently the best backgammon newsletter in content and have a goal of making it the best newsletter in backgammon's history.

It is a tremendous value at \$10 per year and players are invited to send their checks for membership to Bill Barron, P. O. Box 740306, Dallas, TX 75374-0306. Bill Barron can be reached at work (214) 361-9033 or home (214) 231-6353. Malcolm Davis' phone number is (214) 691-7777.

Other organizational goals include: 1) The formation of a Dallas monthly or bi-monthly weekend tournament, 2) Working with other Texas directors to develop a major annual Texas tournament and 3) to help other directors in the development of a strong National Backgammon Association.

Malcolm Davis and Bill Barron welcome visiting players and would be pleased to assist in finding games with players of comparable skill levels.
