

La Tigresse safely bore off down to her last checker which Sawdust hit, avoiding beegee and exit stage left. After a prolonged escape and recapture battle, La Tigresse's checker was closed out and she proceeded to dance long enough for Sawdust to bearoff off 10 checkers. White then entered with a 6-2, providing the position shown. To redouble or not to redouble; that is the question. If black redoubles, does white take? WORLD CUP Match Joe Sylvester vs Alan Steffen 37 Point SemiFinal

During 1989, this match is being presented in this newsletter, 1 to 4 games each month and this month games 24 thru 26 are presented. Along with the 34 games, all the doubling positions will be included. There are some both interesting and exciting games in this match between two of the best.


Instructions: You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 with all points numbered based on the view of the player on roll. The home portion of the board is numbered 1-6. Bearing off is denoted as moving to the 0 'zero' point. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is denoted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 52 with the 5-point made and the 2-point open.


Abbreviations used are CB - Closed Board, EF - Entry Failure, NP - No Play Possible, x - opponents piece was hit, 5^2 - superscribe denotes 2 or more pieces moving to the same point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point. In the doubling positions, Joe will be dark checkers and Alan the light and are shown from Joe Sylvester's side of the board. Study those first before going through the games.


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

Solution - Problem Corner

Analysis of this type of problem is relatively routine for most open players and is a necessary skill for the intermediate players to achieve in order to improve their success rate. In most tournament matches, 4, 6 or 8 point swings are singularly decisive. One must be ready to seize (or avoid) the opportunities. In this particular position, it is fairly obvious that black is a heavy favorite to bear off his remaining five checkers in three rolls, regardless of a worthless 2, 4, or 4-2 on his next roll. In fact, only the joker 2-2 is a real crusher. White bears off in one roll with either 5s or 6s, but is actually not favored to get off in either one or two rolls. It appears, therefore, that black has an excellent chance to not only get back into the match, but also to become the favorite with a redoubled win.

Examination of the possible sequences of rolls shows:

(*) Percentages are net of preceding rolls, not cumulative.

In a money game, perhaps not a double, but how about being down 0-2 in a 7-point match? Dig up those match equity tables and let's take a closer look. If black plays on without redoubling, his match equity is 68.2% to be 2-2 and 31.8% to be 0-4 in the score or $(0.682\times0.50) + (0.328\times0.21) = 0.408$ or 40.8%. However, if he redoubles to 4, he is 68.2% to go up 4-2 and 32.8%to be down 0-6 (Crawford) or $(0.682 \times 0.68) + (0.328 \times 0.10) = 0.496$ or 49.6%. The gain is about 9% in match equity to redouble, so black redoubles.

What about white? Does she drop because of black's potential gain or equity? Her decision is based upon her equity gain or loss, not black's. If she declines the redouble, the match goes to 2-2 or 50% match equity. Her equity by taking is the remainder from 100% of black's equity (100.0-49.6) or 50.4%. Close but still a take.

Admitting, these calculations are very difficult to do accurately while sitting at the board in the heat of the battle, but even a ball park estimate would give black his redouble decision. White's acceptance may be a result of careful calculation, experience, or possibly extreme annoyance at black, having escaped her rightful gammon, boldly returning the cube and putting salt on the wound.

In the match played, Sawdust redoubled and La Tigresse took. Sawdust got the normal rolls to get off in the likely three; but La Tigresse got double 3s followed by 5-1 to win the this game and match and went on to win the weekly tournament. From Sawdust's perspective, the operation was a success, but the patient died. You can't win them all, even if you do analyze well, but you'll almost surely win more than you lose if you are unwilling or unable to make those analyses.
