Feedback on Holland Rule

The historical perspective has always been interesting to me so reading about Tim Holland's comments on his name sake rule was great. The general gist of what I read was that the play in "the good old days" needed the formation of effective rules. But modern play with a greater understanding of the game can shed new light on old rules and established customs. Sometimes this means reexamining a part of a game. Such is the case regarding the "Holland Rule."

The key question is: Do we want to play this game at its highest skill level even when it means the possible abolishment of a custom or rule? If the answer is yes - if we want to increase the skill level where it can be done without upsetting any major element, then eliminating the use of the Holland Rule has to be considered. Many players have recently opted in that direction. Even directors who just a year ago were advocating the Holland rule in their tournaments have made an about face and stopped their support of same.

With the Holland Rule in effect at a tournament, the leader in a match has a certain level of concern about achieving the Crawford game. This concern is minimal because his lead is protected after the Crawford game. That is, if his opponent survives the Crawford game, the leader will see at least four rolls into any game before having to face a cube decision. Thus even the weakest of players can do reasonably well when the Holland Rule is in effect.

Without the Holland Rule, there is a different level of concern for the leader in a match. That concern begins at the start of a match. Playing at the highest skill level, a person will seek cube actions to achieve and then maintain an ODD score so the cube can be used effectively to win the match. This matter can be called MANAGING the cube. Also an effort will be made to avoid a Crawford game, for following that game, a cube decision will have to be made in all likelihood, after seeing only one or two rolls into the game. Thus there is an element of MANAGING the use of the cube as well as the proper application of the Match Winning Chance tables.

Perhaps the most important place where the use of the cube becomes critical when the Holland Rule is not in effect is with 2 points to go. The leader would like to use the cube when the opponent will still take, but he has to judge the cube decision more closely because if taken, he will experience a reship immediately. Yet if a delay is made in giving the cube, there is the risk of a drop with the result of having to play the Crawford game. Thus timing the last double and evaluation of when to make the last double can be critically important to the leader when the Holland rule is not in force. Players not skilled in this aspect of cube use will of course want to support the Holland rule, while the skilled player will want to avoid same.

It is clear to me that the skill level of backgammon is increased when the Holland rule is not used. So the U.S. Tournament Rules committee should continue to not include any mention of the Holland Rule. Some might think of allowing it only for the intermediate division where skills are still being formed by the players. But remember, the intermediate level is the training ground for the OPEN division. Don't corrupt it!





This year the **HBC Newsletter** presents one of the quarter final matches from the first World Cup between twice world champion Bill Robertie and Ray Glaeser. World Cup II will be held in Boston, August 7-12. Qualifiers for World Cup II will be held across the country, including 10th Chicago Open (May 25-28) and Michigan Summer Championships (June 29-July 1).

Instructions: You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 with all points numbered based on the view of the player on roll. The home portion of the board is numbered 1-6. Bearing off is denoted as moving to the 0 'zero' point. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is denoted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 52 with the 5-point made and the 2-point open.

Abbreviations used are CB - Closed Board, EF -Entry Failure, NP - No Play Possible, x - opponents piece was hit, 5^2 - superscribe denotes 2 or more pieces moving to the same point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point. In the doubling positions, Bill is the dark checkers and Ray the light and the board is shown from Bill Robertie's side. Study those first before going through the games.
