





Videos as an added learning tool...

When I walked into the 1990 Midwest Championship and learned that one of the door prizes was a copy of the video showing the match between 1990 Reno finalists, Doug Roberts and Bill Davis, I secretly hoped I would win it. Guess what? I did win the video and I found the match to be both entertaining and educational.

The Indianapolis backgammon community is made up largely of intermediate players. Butch and Mary Ann Meese have done more to encourage beginning backgammon players than I have ever seen done before. David Smith has volunteered his time to give lessons to beginners and there is a beginner backgammon tournament held in round-robin format every Thursday evening. The beginners eventually do become intermediate players within a reasonable amount of time and one of the questions that I am frequently asked is "What do you think the best backgammon book is after I've read Magriel?" Another one of the frequently asked questions is "What's the best way to learn how to play like the professionals do?" In my opinion, Bill Robertie's blue book, "Advanced Backgammon" is the one that I found to be most useful and comprehendable for the intermediate player. However, my answer to these folks is that they should spend some time watching chouettes and listening to the commentaries of Joe Sylvester, Jack Kissane, Neil Kazaross, etc. It affords an excellent opportunity to not only watch plays but listen to their reasoning as well.

Now, I have another answer. VIDEOS! First of all, it is usually educational to watch the players who have made it to the finals of any major tournament. In this match, however, there were several instances of poor cube decisions and incorrect checker plays. Although this can be somewhat embarrassing for the players, it serves as an excellent study tool in that it affords the commentators an opportunity to analyze and discuss backgammon strategy in their critique. Kit Woolsey, Joe Sylvester and Kent Goulding entertain you with their cutting remarks and barbed commentary while instructing you with their insights and match strategies. There are some sequences in that match that I found to be particularly instructive in that Joe and Kit are so frequently opposed in their opinions of the "correct play". They openly discuss and debate their respective points of view. Although going play by play through matches and studying various players' analysis on match play and strategy is certainly a worthwhile study approach, I have always found it easier to understand the thought processes while being able to watch the match in progress and listen to the simultaneous dialogue. I do believe that if match videos with audio ever become affordable, these would certainly be a viable learning tool for any player at any level of play.

### The three point prime...by Harold Branch





Diagram 1 appeared in the May 1990 Hoosier Backgammon Club newsletter . In a match to 33 and trailing 18 to 26, Bill Robertie (Black) doubled. Ray Glaeser (White) "took". What do you think about the double? About the take? My first glance impression suggested double and pass. But, wait a minute! I see the 20 covering numbers, but how many actually close out the board? Six - that is all; 6-2, 5-2 and 4-2. And what is the effect of the 9 lowest number on Black's board? Experiment a little. How do you play a 3-1? Or a 2-2? Or a 3-3!?! The point is that 25% of Black's numbers will transfer a small advantage back to White. So it looks like a take. Was it a good double then? Yes. it was an excellent double. And a mandatory take. Bill, trailing in the match, has a reasonable positive expectation and has a wild hope - really forlorn that Ray might err and pass.



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Now let's give Black a present of 4 pips (Diagram 2). Bill would double. There are not enough gammons not to double. Would Ray take or pass? He would pass promptly, wasting no time. So would you and if you would take this, don't admit it to anyone!

Disregarding the extra 4 pips completely, we notice two differences: One - all 12 of Black's cover numbers close the board, not just 6. Two - no numbers disrupt Black's 5 point board.

To measure the approximate effect of that big 3-point prime, look at the results of 200 random rollouts for each diagram after the double and take.

Diagram 1 - Black won 125 plain, 8 gammons. White won 62 plain, 5 gammons. Black scores 138 net instead of 200. Diagram 2 - Black won 164 plain, 6 gammons. White won 26 plain, 4 gammons. Black scores 284 net instead of 200.

So that little obstacle (a 3-point prime) is easy to overlook but changes an easy take into a BIG PASS. Those of us who are a little hard of thinking find this type of study instructive.




33 Point Quarter Final Match


This year the **HBC Newsletter** presents one of the quarter final matches from the first World Cup between twice world champion Bill Robertie and Ray Glaeser. World Cup II will be held in Boston, August 7-12. Qualifiers for World Cup II will be held across the country, including Michigan Summer Championships (June 29-July 1).


Instructions: You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 with all points numbered based on the view of the player on roll. The home portion of the board is numbered 1-6. Bearing off is denoted as moving to the 0 'zero' point. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is denoted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 52 with the 5-point made and the 2-point open.

Abbreviations used are CB - Closed Board, EF - Entry Failure, NP - No Play Possible, x - opponents piece was hit,  $5^2$  - superscribe denotes 2 or more pieces moving to the same point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point. In the doubling positions, Bill is the dark checkers and Ray the light and the board is shown from Bill Robertie's side. Study those first before going through the games.
