## SIMPLE ANSWERS TO SIMPLE QUESTIONS?

The Newcomer recently interrupted a mixed bag chouette, produced this bear-off position and asked what appeared to be a simple question: "White doubles - should Black accept?


It was quite amusing when each of the five players had a different response! What follows is the meat of their answers and why:

NOVICE PLAYER said, Pass - I can only win if White rolls a one, and I probably won't even get to roll at all."
WEAK INTERMEDIATE said, Take - White misses with any ace, which is 11/36 rolls. I only need $9 / 36$ rolls to reach the required $25 \%$ chance I need to accept this cube."

STRONG INTERMEDIATE said, Pass - This is a two-roll proposition - White's misses times Black's winning rolls. 11/36 x 25/36 = 275/1296, or less than the 924 rolls in 1296 (25\%) required to Take."
WELL-READ OPEN said, Take. Kleinman's Rule of Excess Eighteens applies here, since ownership of the cube and subsequent redouble potential must be taken into consideration. Calculating this, the adjusted chances are 11/36 $x(25+7) / 36=352 / 1296$, or greater than the 324 rolls in 1296 needed to justify a take."

MR. EXPERT said, "It is both a Pass and a Take."

Well, this really brought down the house! Hoots and hollers abounded, until finally the very confused Newcomer asked how it could possibly be both a Pass and a Take at the same time. To which MR. EXPERT replied:
"It could be either a proper Pass or a proper Take, depending upon the particulars of the position. Is this an initial double? If it is a redouble, what is the value of the cube? Is it a money game? Or is it a match? If so, what is the score? And which side is ahead? Are the players of equal strength, or is one considerably weaker than the other? These are the types of questions one must ask of the position before your question can even be answered!"

Of course, this position is usually a Take under most conditions. The moral of the story? There really isn't one, although a closer look at the different responses does give us some insight into the inner workings of the models that people use to make backgammon decisions. The responses indicate how players may be progressing on a learning curve, gaining more and more knowledge. But until they reach the top, armed with a little information may be dangerous and lead to mistakes in judgement with confidence. Of particular interest is how STRONG INTERMEDIATE makes an incorrect cube decision based on relatively sound but misapplied information, yet WEAK INTERMEDIATE gets the answer correct with incomplete knowledge of the position. This is somewhat typical of how the play of intermediate players usually gets worse before it ultimately gets better. And WELL-READ OPEN is so full of knowledge that in his haste to apply it, loses focus of some of the important aspects of this (or any) position. The true expert learns to ask questions before deciding similar to any old wise man worth his salt.

## Lake Tahoe Colossus Event <br> Neil Kazaross vs Mika Lidov 15 Point Match

The HBC Newsletter presents a match from the 1990 Colossus Event at the Lake Tahoe Tournament between Neil Kazaross and Mika Lidov.

Instructions: You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 based on the view of the player on roll. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. The home portion of the board is numbered 1-6. Bearing off is noted as moving to the zero "0" point. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is noted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 52 with the 5 -point made and the 2 -point open.
Abbreviations used are CB - Closed Board, EF Entry Failure, MP - Misplay, NP - No Play Possible, x - opponent's piece was hit, $5^{2}$ - superscript denotes 2 or more pieces moving to the same point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point.

In the doubling positions, Neil is the dark checkers, Mika the light checkers and the positions are shown from Neil's side of the board. Study the doubling positions first before going through the games.
