






## **Early Match Position**

7 Point Match, White - 0 Black - 0 Black to play 6-1?



This position comes early in a 7-point match. The roll of 6-1 gives Black more than one choice of a good play and it's this kind of position that causes some players problems. Making the 7-point is a good play. Making the 5-point is a good play. Other players will notice that hitting twice might be a good play. Let's look at each play.

Making the 7-point (13/7 8/7): this play makes a good point and leaves no direct shots. Depending on what White does on his roll, Black may have a double.

Making the 5-point (11/5 6/5): this play makes a good point but leaves a direct 6 shot. Having a 4-point home board compared to his opponents 2-point board is a big advantage, but is it big enough to justify leaving the direct shot? If White does not hit, Black will most likely have an easy double and questionable take. Black can leave a direct shot because of the better home board; White only has two points made.

Hitting twice (8/2x/1x): this play takes the whole roll away for White. If White does not answer with a hitting ace, double 2's or double 5's, Black must

decide whether to double out or go for the gammon.

Black has an advantage in this position and the 6-1 is a good roll that can improve the position. Since the cube has not been turned, you should be thinking of moving with the cube in mind. Which move will produce the best chance to produce a doubling position on your next roll? JellyFish likes making the 5-point which is what I like also. I do not like it when White rolls any of the hitting numbers, but I would most likely double on most of White's non-hitting numbers.

## Special K Club

When you sit down to play a match, on average, you are 50% to win the match. With a full field of 16 players on Thursday evening, your chances of winning are 1 in 16. Some players have not only won first place two weeks, but three weeks in a row. Sean Garber and Don Woods have done it. And Chuck Stimming did it the last week in October and the first two weeks of November this year. A player's chances of winning ten matches in a row is 1 in 1024. In mathematics, the letter **K** is used to represent (or shorthand) 1024.

A person's chances of winning the Hoosier Lottery is over 12 million to 1, or like winning over 23 matches in a row. Checking the last 10 years of HBC history, a select group of players have put together a winning streak of 10 matches or more. Below are those rare streaks. Note: A player's streak does not end just because s/he misses an event or two. The streak can continue on any weekly play and any one-day tournment that a player competes in.
