


Money Game, Black to play 4-1?



Maximize your Options Minimize Opponent's by Chuck Bower

This problem is a prime vs. prime position for obvious reasons. Both sides have strong but incomplete full primes with opponent's checkers trapped behind them. The side that breaks first most likely will lose!

Before Black's roll, Jellyfish level-7 evaluates Black as a slight cubeless favorite (0.046 equity). There are certainly better rolls than 4-1, but that is

what the dice gods have given us.

No matter what Black moves, there are good and bad things that can occur. Moving 24/23 is the direct approach to escape and maintain timing. But the split back checkers then become targets for White's attack. Not splitting the back checkers will work if White can't get his/her checker on Black's 3-point in motion, but probably will fail otherwise because Black will likely be forced to break his/her prime first.

I investigated four plays using Jellyfish v3.0

level-6 cubeless rollouts; three active plays: 24/23 with either 13/9, 6/2, or 7/3x. I also tried the passive 13/8 without the split. Surprisingly this group broke into two clear categories. The conservative hold your anchor move 13/8 did not do well. White is given two options: attack in the outfield or go slowly and watch Black's prime break first. The pure play, 13/9, 24/23 also fared poorly. White is given two options here as well: attack in the infield or attack in the outfield. In both of these cases, Black's prime holds but White usually has enough time to get the back checkers moving.

The best two plays both have ironic aspects. As a general rule in prime vs. prime positions, you want to avoid putting the opponent on the bar. As long as a player is on the bar, s/he can't break his/her prime. But a second important ploy is to put as many of your opponent's checkers behind your prime, thus forcing his/her prime to break. 7/3x, 24/23 attempts the latter at the expense of the former. If White enters Bar/22x or Bar/24/18x, the plan will have failed miserably. If Black can cover the blot on his/her 3-point, then s/he can win directly by escaping the back checkers while White stays on the bar OR indirectly when White enters with an one and then is forced to break

within the next couple rolls.

Jellyfish rollouts prefer the ugly 24/23, 6/2 most of all, slightly beating out 7/3x, 24/23 by 0.025 equity units (and the other two plays by more than 0.1). This type of play--voluntarily killing a useful checker--was almost unheard of among expert players prior to the neural net robots entering the scene. Although one should use this kind of tactic sparingly, here it has the advantage of giving White the fewest opportunities while keeping Black's paths open--attack, escape, or win the timing battle.
