


Anticipation

7 Point Match Black - 5 White - 3 Black to play 6-1?

The illustrated position is not such an unusual one. Similar situations come up frequently in our backgammon lives. But, what is the correct play here? Please choose your play AND the reasons for your choice before reading on.

The logical mind might perceive: there seems to be three candidate plays. Playing 13/6 clears an awkward point, but leaves 15 shots. Moving 8/2, 8/7 leaves the fewest shots: 11. Playing 10/3 is intermediate between the other options; a moderately awkward point is given up, and 14 shots result. It seems clear that the intermediate play is the worst, since one extra shot can hardly be worth leaving a more awkward position. Thus one must choose between leaving the fewest shots or clearing the most awkward point.

The seasoned player might continue: "Why give the opponent the extra four shots since, assuming the shot is missed, s/he is going to have to give up one of the defensive points (21 point or 13 point) VERY soon?" Leaving fewer

shots now (by playing 8/2, 8/7) allows Black to "have his/her cake and eat it, too". White will likely abandon the midpoint before Black has to leave an (indirect) shot on his/her midpoint. Thus fewer shots now and few (or no) shots later. It's obvious: 8/2, 8/7.

If this has been your thinking, then you need to work on your match play technique. What is the score? Where is the cube?? Those are the very first questions a match player should consider. At this match score, White is looking for any excuse to cube. And any excuse translates into moderate game winning chances combined with some anticipation of a gammon.

Black should quickly realize that, regardless of where the blot is left, White will see gammon chances (because of the blot) and double. Black should also realize that the subsequent position is a clear take, since gammon chances aren't overwhelming, and Black is not much worse than even in this game. So, assuming double/take after the current play, which choice should Black make?

If Black has taken all of the above into consideration, then s/he can't be faulted. In fact, the choice is pretty close. Jellyfish v3.0 cubeless rollouts say that Black will win 52.2% of games after 8/2, 8/7 and 50.7% after 13/6. (Joint standard deviation is less than 0.5% game winning chances.) However, that is only part of the story. By running from the midpoint, Black will lose only 7.7% gammons while the 8/2, 8/7 play loses 11.9% gammons. Which is more important: winning more games or losing fewer gammons?

Assuming the cube is on 2 at this score, gammon losses trade even money with wins. (This is different from money play where two gammon losses equals one win.) So the play that wins more games (52.2% vs. 50.7%, or 1.5% more wins) isn't worth the extra gammon losses (11.9% vs. 7.7% or 4.2% more gammon losses).

Certainly if the score were 6-6/7, the rollouts show that leaving fewer shots here would be best since, at that score, only game winning chances are relevant. At money play, the decision is quite close, so that either choice is reasonable. But at this match score (anticipating the imminent double), minimizing gammons dominates the close decisions. So, did you make the right play, AND for the right reasons? If so, you get to write next month's article!
