


**Pressure** by Chuck Bower



Money Game. Black to play 6-6?

In a middle game, if double sixes play at all they are usually a good roll. Here the robots say Black actually LOSES equity. The eight rolls that hit and cover were Black's best. Only five of Black's checkers can even move a six. Does this make the best play easy to find?

White is trying to get his/her back checkers home. One way to do that is to put Black on the bar, keeping him/her occupied while White sneaks around. Therefore, leaving shots isn't a wise plan for Black. However, there is no way to clean up all blots with this roll. Three 6's would be needed to get the back checker to safety and then the fourth 6 would require Black to open up one of his/her remaining outfield points. 23/5, 9/3 would be the choice if you really needed to get that back checker home. The problem is that one of the defensive points would have to be sacrificed soon, and it will be difficult to do that without leaving White a lot of targets.

The safest place for the back checker is right where it is--on the 23-point. White doesn't have much ammo to attack it, yet. Seeing this, Black's plays now seem to narrow down to two: 20/8(2) and 20/14(2), 9/3(2). Both moves give Black a decent holding game. How do we decide which one is better?

If Black plays 20/8(2), his/her game plan is to stay on the 18-point and wait for blots to appear. Best chances are when White has to clear the midpoint. That will probably take a while. 20/14(2), 9/3(2) keeps the pressure on White. Black is trying to get his/her shot sooner rather than later. As a bonus, the blot in the home board is covered, putting even more pressure on white to get safe. It may look like Black's position is inflexible after this move, but 1's, and 2's move inside the board and 3's, 5's, and 6's can be played by the back checker.

Snowie and Jellyfish agree that 20/14(2), 9/3(2) beats out 20/8(2) by a bit in cubeless equity. (JF level-6 rollouts say the difference is around 0.04.) In addition, a Snowie cubeFUL rollout says the difference is magnified. The best play wins about 1% more cubeless games, meaning Black is closer to being able to win the game by turning the cube. The cubeful (1-ply play, 1-ply cube) Snowie rollout has 20/14(2), 9/3(2) better by about 0.06 equity with a centered cube. Keep the pressure on White NOW!
