


## Offense or Defense by Butch Meese



Black to play 4-3?

Black started the game with 4-1 moving 13/9, 24/23. White answered with 6-5 moving 24/13. Black then rolls 4-3!! Two great plays to choose from: either make the 20-point (defensive play) or the 5-point (offensive play). Picking from two great plays is a common occurrence in backgammon.

If Black makes the 5-point, White has few rolls to make home board points and most likely will bring down builders from the midpoint. Black will have hitting opportunity with the two back checkers.

If Black makes the 20-point, White will have a hard time making any kind of prime in front of Black. While White waits to escape the last back checker, White will start playing behind Black hoping to make home board points. If White does hit any checkers, Black will have a great point to re-enter and get the checkers back in play. Making the 20-point now let's Black make home board points in the up-coming rolls.

But there is another factor that comes into play in picking the best play: the score of the match. There are times when making the 5-point is

better than making the 20-point.

The position was run on Snowie Version 2.0 as a 3-ply evaluation at all scores in a 5-point match and in a money game. The cube was centered in all situations except when the leader had 4 points in a non-Crawford game.

The results show that either making the 20-point or the 5-point as the top two plays in all situations. Only in 3 situations did the third play come close to the top two plays.

Backgammon is not a simple game. If it were, most of us wouldn't be playing it. Here is my list of books to read if you are serious about backgammon:

- 1) **Backgammon** by Paul Magriel. Definitely read this first!!
- 2) Advanced Backgammon by Bill Robertie.
- 3) How to Play Tournament Backgammon by Kit Woolsey.
- 4) Vision Laughs at Counting, with Advice to the Dicelorn by Danny Kleinman.
- 5) **New Ideas in Backgammon** by Kit Woolsey and Hal Heinrich.
- 6) Winning: The Psychology of Competition by Stuart H. Walker.

Don't ramrod through these books. To do a decent job, you need to spread this reading out over about a year or longer period of time and one year assumes you devote a HUGE amount of your time to backgammon. Also, read them multiple times not consecutively. There are advanced players who reread Magriel's **Backgammon** every few years and continue to learn from it!
