



Eliminating The Bigger Threat by Chuck Bower




Money Game, Black to play 6-2?

Many backgammon players have memorized rules which help them make a decision when two or more candidate plays are otherwise close. In the Position 1, Black has a choice of which checker to hit. One of my rules says it is best to send back the checker which costs the opponent most in the pipcount. This isn't just relevant to the race, but often takes away a homeside builder, preventing the opponent from building a better prime and/or home board. I followed my rule and played 21/15x, 13/11. Snowie rollouts say 13/7x/5 beats all other candidates by 0.05 cubeless equity units or more (60% vs. 59% total wins and 25% vs 22% gammon wins). Why?



Money Game, Black to play 6-2?

A powerful method to help answering **why** is to shift the position around and see what Snowie thinks then. Could the fact that White doesn't have an anchor make hitting low and bringing down a builder better? Position 2 sheds some light. This is a similar position but with one of White's checker's moved from his/her 6-point back to the 24-point, giving White an anchor. Here a Snowie rollout says 21/15x, 22/20 is about equal to 13/7x/5 in equity, with 62% total wins and 26% gammons in either case. So the gammons are a factor, but when does 21/15x become CLEARLY the best play?



Money Game, Black to play 5-2?

Position 3 is the original (Position 1) except moving a White checker from the 18-point to the 17-point, moving another from the 10-point to the 9-point, and changing the roll to 5-2. Note that Black has a similar decision: which outfield to hit NOW Snowie's top five plays all include hitting on White's side of the board. 22/20, 13/8x comes in fifth best, although only 0.035 units of cubeless equity out of first. Now the picture has become clear. Black's plan in Position 1 and Position 2 is to keep White from making his/her 18-point. A closeout would be nice, but the first priority is to keep the opponent from making an advanced holding point in this case, Black's barpoint. The bigger threat is White establishing a good defense, so remove that possibility from the table!


