

Repeated Threats



Money Game, Black to Play 5-2?

Backgammon is more than just memorizing opening rolls and counting shots. Among many skills, a player needs to know how to drive to the finish line. I had the Black checkers in the illustrated position, battling HBC points leader Jim Curtis. How should I have played this less than ideal roll?

Note that White is far ahead in the race. After this roll, White will be ahead by 18 or 19 pips. If merely a straight race (with no blocking and no wastage), White would be a prohibitive favorite with about 93% game winning chances. Ignoring Black's blocking power but accounting for White's inefficient homeboard, the Strommen Backgammon Position Analyzer still gives White better than 70% game winning chances.

Here Black's broken prime makes him a favorite, but the key fact is that Black must maintain his blocking power. Every time White is on roll, he becomes a favorite with six rolls: 6-3, 5-3 and 4-3. How does Black keep the advantage?

Over the table, I played 11/9, 6/1x. My (flawed) thinking went like this: I want to keep a checker outside to hunt down White's fleeing checker. Furthermore, if I get hit back on my acepoint,

White will still be blocked. I may even get shots at a second checker if White enters with a 1-2. If White cooperates and stays on the bar, I gain in the race. Sounds convincing, but unfortunately these three reasons just don't add up.

Another approach is to leave White's blot alone, letting him crash his board further. Three plays compete for this gameplan: 11/9, 7/2; 11/6, 7/5; and 11/6, 5/3. Yet the problems with these moves are shared with 11/9, 6/1x: White repeatedly threatens to escape.

The best plan is to attempt to squelch White's chances ASAP. 11/4 looks risky, but in fact the downside isn't any worse than the other plays: White escapes (by hitting) with the same six rolls. The upside is huge, however. If White misses, Black covers with 27 numbers, nearly locking up the win. Even when Black fails to cover, White may not roll a 3. And if White rolls 3-2 after Black starts the 4-point, Black gets an immediate shot in White's homeboard. Even when the worst happens and White hits and jumps into the outfield, Black has some chances of picking off that blot as it comes around.

Even if Black's spare on the 2-point were back on the 3-point, allowing White to point-on-head, 11/4 is STILL the correct play by about 2% game winning chances.

Only if Black were much closer in the race or if White's board stronger would slotting become inferior, risking more than it would gain. But in the illustrated position, White will repeatedly threaten to snatch the lead, and Black's best approach is to go for the sure win immediately by slotting the only missing point in his prime.
