Louisville Final in Championship Division

Terry Kuchenbrod of Louisville guaranteed himself a piece of the pie by becoming the main flight undefeated against a strong Midwest field in the popular true double-elimination format. Terrv waited for the second chance challenger knowing that he would have to be defeated twice to be denied the top prize. Quint McTyeire, also of Louisville, gained momentum by marching through the second chance bracket that carried him into the first match against Terry. That match ended 13-5 in Quint's favor. In the 13-point final match Quint's momentum continued to a 10-2 lead before Terry staged a comeback to tie the match at 11 all. In the next game, an early cube put the match and championship on the line. The game developed with Quint hoping for any kind of a shot as Terry started to bear-off. Quint got and hit the shot with a closed board. After Quint cleared his 6-point without any checkers off, Terry popped right out Both players dice turned hot with with 6-3. doubles, but Quint got the upper hand by back-toback double 5's to capture the 40th INDIANA OPEN crown. 

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
Chuck Stimming Wins 1st HBC Club Championship

Open Forum

It has been suggested by a reader that space be provided for open discussion on the doubling positions presented in this newsletter. Below is the first contribution. Enjoy!

The first cube decision in the April 1992 issue struck me as remarkable. Nack offered a powerhouse double. Bill took it.



Consider: Black has a tremendous lead in the race 90-149! He has one direct shot plus extras - actually 16 hitting numbers. White has three blots total. Three of his checkers are huddle on the 24 point. And Black has a bigger board.

However, White notices a hole in Black's board. And he does have an anchor. All his checkers are in play. A couple of Black's checkers have outrun themselves. He has some priming and even blitzing potential of his own - but these prospects are a bit remote at the moment.

I wouldn't take it. But that doesn't mean it isn't a take. I did 200 [roll-outs] with no more than the usual number of errors and here is what I came up with:

	Plain wins	Gammons	Backgammons.
Black	55	45	13!
White	83!	3	1

This is 184 points net to Black, instead of 200. If correct, these figures would suggest a take by about 8%. I think Bill is entitled to some big credit for his courage and judgment. He saw it as takeable and he took it. Well done. *Harold Branch. Louisville*



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



The **HBC** Newsletter presents a 21-point match between Nack Ballard and Bill Robertie from the Masters' Invitational, 4th Nevada State Championships, June 1987.

Instructions: You will need a backgammon board to follow along. The board is numbered 1 to 24 based on the view of the player on roll. Each player will always be moving from a higher to lower point with only the point(s) moved to used. The home portion of the board is numbered 1 thru 6. Bearing off is noted as moving to the zero (0) point. To make it easier to follow, the larger number rolled is noted first. In some situations where the smaller number rolled is forced, it will be presented first. An example: being on the BAR with a roll of 5-2 with the 5-point made and the 2-point open.

Abbreviations used: Closed Board(**CB**), Entry Failure(**EF**), Misplay(**MP**), No Play Possible(**NP**), opponent's piece was hit (x), superscript(5²) denotes 2 or more pieces moving to a point; this example has 2 pieces moving to the 5 point.

In the doubling positions, Nack is the dark checkers and Bill the light. The positions are shown from Nack's side of the board; study them first before going through the games.
