He won Player of the Month an unprecedented 6 times (4 months in a row). To show that it was not just a lucky streak, Jim achieved the triple crown at the 50th Indiana Open Backgammon Tournament. He finished second in the Championship Division, won the consolation in the prestigious Tournament of Champions and cashed in the Indy300 Jackpot. Many kudos to Jim Curtis. 

Tomorrow Is Only A Day Away by Chuck Bower



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Money game. Black to play 6-5?

Often the most difficult plays are the ones where there are many candidates to choose from. That's not the source of the problem here. In the illustrated position, Black's 5 is forced: entering from the bar. With only three legal 6's, shouldn't Black's remaining decision be simple? How would you play this?

Black will be 9 pips behind in the race after playing this move. That's not so bad, but Black should be looking at how best to send a White checker back to reverse the race lead. In the actual game, Black was thinking:

- a) I have the security of the 20-point anchor should things go poorly,
- b) by advancing to the 14-point I put pressure on White's blot,
- c) 13/7 gives up the midpoint prematurely and
- d) 7/1 makes my board a mess and starts the lowly acepoint. Continuing 20/14 is the play that makes the most sense.

Snowie says this logic is faulty. Moving 7/1 is better than 20/14 by 0.08 units of cubeless equity, winning 2.5% more total games and losing almost 3% fewer gammons. 13/7 is a distant third place, 0.15 cubeless equity units worse than 7/1. So, where did Black's reasoning fail him?

For starters, White's position is stripped which usually indicates making a quiet play, waiting for White's inflexibility to cost him. Second, volunteering a double shot is usually wrong, unless you don't mind being sent back. Here getting hit and fanning would be quite costly, giving White a solid double but also a clear take

for Black.

In the November article, where hitting was best because it looked like Black would not get future chances, here White has a lot of real estate to clear before getting past White's anchor. Forcing the issue is not required. Finally, with the time available Black can afford to leave a couple blots in his board. even one on acepoint. Making the 1-point is wrong when the game is likely to turn into either a priming battle or a backgame. In a holding game, as is the case here, all homeboard points are valuable so slotting the acepoint isn't a liability.

There is no substitute for good judgment at backgammon. But that judgment doesn't appear overnight; it takes years of experience to hone. November, the lesson was don't leave the action for tomorrow, because tomorrow may never come. This month it's don't walk into а storm todav when tomorrow's forecast is for Unfortunately, sunshine. knowing which situation either) is present can't be taught in a couple newsletter articles.
